General Overview

The Educational Talent Search Program (ETS) is a federal program that identifies and serves individuals interested in post secondary education or vocational training. Guidance activities are offered on various topics such as self-exploration, career decisions, financial aid application, and college registration.

What Can ETS offer me?

- ◇ Academic, financial, career, or personal counseling Including advice on entry or re-entry to secondary or postsecondary programs.
- ◇ Career exploration and aptitude assessment
- ◇ Tutorial services
- ◇ Information on postsecondary education

- ◇ Special activities for sixth, seventh, and eighth graders

Objectives

The goal of Educational Talent Search (ETS) is to increase the number of youth, 6th-12th grade, from disadvantaged backgrounds who complete high school and enroll in the post secondary education institution of their choice. Educational Talent Search also serves high school drop-outs, to age 27, by encouraging them to re-enter the educational system and complete their education.

Description

The Educational Talent Search Program works very closely with campus and off-campus partners. Campus partners include Office of Diversity and Inclusion and Out-Reach and Civic Engagement. Working very closely with the Lansing School District, Talent Search provides academic seminars, mentoring, and tutoring for program participants. Talent Search maintains at least 10 to 20 contact hours with students on a weekly basis.

Outcomes

Accomplishments for 2014

Talent Search was funded to provide services to 561 students and served 568 students during the academic year of 2014.

90% of non-senior participants continued to the next academic grade level

95% of seniors served during the 2014 academic year received the district mandated secondary school diploma

75% of seniors served by the program were accepted into an institution of higher education
